


Barking and Dagenham Race and Social Justice Charter














Year 1 Carnival

The Notting Hill Carnival was first held in 1966 as an offshoot of the Trinidad Carnival, celebrating Caribbean culture and traditions in London.


When the Notting Hill Carnival first started in Notting Hill, around 500 people attended the Caribbean festival. The carnival has since become the largest street festival in Europe, attracting hundreds of thousands to London, and continues to grow in popularity. You can usually expect to see some 50,000 performers in the parade and more than 30 sound systems, with more than one million people attending over the carnival weekend.

Year 4 Walter Tull

Building positive relationships

The connections children and young people have with the adults around them is key. Repetition of positive experiences developed through Thrive activities supports their development, helping them to:

- · feel good about themselves and know that they matter
- · increase their sense of security and trust
- increase their emotional wellbeing
- · improve their capacity to be creative and curious
- · increase their self-esteem and confidence to learn
- learn to recognise and regulate their feelings
- learn to think before behaving in a certain way
- · ...and much more.

How does it work?

- Create an action-plan at a group and individual level, with a raft of strategies and age-appropriate activities to build into teaching to support social and emotional development.
- Measure and report on the progress of whole groups and individuals over time.

Philip's art helps transform Dagenham school playground

Dagenham Engine Plant's Philip Hill has revealed his amazing art skills by bringing a much-needed boost to a school playground.

The Engine Eval Office technician has transformed Hunters Hall Primary School in Dagenham with recreations of colourful murals designed by the pupils.

Philip, who was aided by partner Tracy — who works at the school — and his eldest son, brought to life children's images including a 'thank you' message to NHS workers and a mural in honour of Ava Cottell, the two-year-old sister of a pupil at the school, who sadly passed away with leukaemia.

Philip said: "The playground areas needed some brightening up, so the school tasked the children with an artwork project and the four best creations would then get painted on to the playground walls, which is where Tracy asked if I could get involved."

The paint was donated by school staff and children's parents, and the project took place between August and October last year.

Philip said: "The project was completed entirely in our spare time, with some help from my eldest son.

"But after the summer shutdown, Dagenham Engine Plant permitted me two full days paid community service leave to help me complete the artwork."

He added: "The end result was awesome, and the school and children loved the new look to their playground.

"It was a great feeling of pride and achievement for us. I would recommend voluntary community work to anyone at



Dagenham Engine Plant – it gives you a sense of pride, satisfaction and it generates happiness for others, so it's well worth while.
