


RACE & SOCIAL JUSTICE Newsletter 1

Welcome to our first RSJ Newsletter! What a great way to start 2022!

This monthly update aims to focus on the development of the Race & Social Justice in Barking & Dagenham schools & beyond...a way of keeping in touch, sharing news, views, and what's going on in our schools in B&D.

This will be a forum for sharing ideas, asking questions, and keeping track of who is doing what and when in our borough. A way of having some open & honest conversations, tackling some misconceptions, having some difficult and awkward conversations, and just information giving!

I hope that the RSJ project is kept alive and at the forefront of all our actions and decisions to change the lives of all our young people of all backgrounds, race, and ethnicity!

Why This, Why Now!

The Race & Social Justice Project was first conceived at a meeting in November 2020 of the BDSIP board. The world was changing drastically at this time, and we were all still stunned from the death of George Floyd in the USA by the police. Tensions were high, our young people were angry and confused, and we all agreed 'enough is enough!'.

Whilst it was easy to make some quick fixes in schools, the board of BDSIP all were adamant and in agreement that was not the correct response. Over the next few months members of the board researched other models in other Local Authorities, (many thanks to Wokingham, Reading, Newham, & Enfield); we met several strong voices for Race & Social Justice and recruited a team of willing volunteers within the headteacher community and LA to drive forward the project and subsequent change. The project had to be led by headteachers to make any difference in schools.

There was no right or wrong way of beginning this journey, and it evolved as we spoke to so many more knowledgeable and experienced than ourselves. Using all the information we had read, researched and discussed, we set up the Race & Social Justice Project, to have a coordinated, and active approach to tackling deep rooted inequalities for our pupils and staff.

This is not a prescriptive tick box audit/ model but the Project leadership team is clear that any activity linked to race & social justice must not be tokenistic or stand alone. It should fit seamlessly into your daily practice, and link to the workstreams we have identified. We know that every school is at a different starting point of this journey.

Facilitators Network:

We now have about 40 facilitators in schools across the borough. Our first Network meeting took place in October 2021...and there was a great turn out. Thanks to Warren school for the venue!

Facilitators shared their 'why'...

- Allowing all children to be represented in what they/we do, and believe in themselves, and that they can achieve anything.
- We have a diverse staff group but this is the same for our leadership group
- Create awareness of different cultures and promote an inclusive environment across my/all schools

Many facilitators shared their own personal experiences of growing up or working in the borough and the racism they faced in schools as youngsters or as adults. They also talked openly about the racism our young people continue to face today, and the challenges that they encounter in daily life.

Facilitators expressed their concerns about dealing with such an emotive issue but also their hopes and dreams for the project.

Reading & Research


Since taking on this role we have found there is so much research, reading, books, articles, etc around Race, Social Justice, and equality, diversity & inclusion.

- > Help us move the project forward...through the newsletter & social media feeds like SLACK (IT help needed!) to keep us all updated.




