





uring the war, at the time I should have started school aged 5, I was evacuated with my Mother, brother Tony and sister Jill to a small village in Pewsey, Wiltshire. It was wartime, and my father Joe was serving in the Royal Navy. I started school in the village school in Pewsey. I have no memory of that school as I only went there for one term. My father was discharged from the navy as medically unfit after an operation for a mastoid. He rented a house at 79 Auriel Avenue in Dagenham and we moved there in, I think, 1941.

I can remember my mother taking me to Hunters Hall Primary school to enroll me and I was then able to attend. The first day I attended my mother paid a local older boy 6 pence to take me to school, which entailed crossing Rainham Road South a busy major road, after the second days attendance I said to my mother, you don't need to pay anymore, I know the way and thereafter I went on my own. It was a walk of over a mile and half. Years afterwards a primary school was built at the end of our street.

Hunters Hall School catered for children from a wide area mostly from Dagenham Council Estate. The classrooms were built around a quadrangle, they were on the ground floor, the inner of the quadrangle was grassed over with some flower beds. During my years at the school children were never allowed on the quadrangle and I never set foot on that area. There were brick built air raid shelters in the playground and in corner was boys toilet with a tar covered wall as a urinal and 3 or 4 filthy WC's.

The reception classes was called the Infants and were mixed. I am not certain but I think my teacher's names were Miss Grant and Miss Rushton. I was in the Infants for a year and a half as I joined half way through the year. After the Infants the children were moved into either the big boys or the big girls, and no further mixing was possible at the school.\the pupil stayed in the same class for the whole year and the teacher taught all the subjects. We were not streamed.

During my first year in the 'big boys' my teacher was called Miss McCecknie. She punished me one day, for some misdemeanor, by holding me across her lap and pulling up the leg of my short trousers and slapping me hard on my bare thigh, it was very painful. I told my mother and some time later she used the same punishment which offended my sense of fair play as I had confided the type of punishment to her in confidence, not to be used against me

My next teacher was Miss Tattam, a small woman who punished her class by caning the culprit with some hard strokes of the cane on their hands. I was not caned by her whilst in her class.

I was very friendly with a boy called Michael Sands one day we were in the playground when it started to rain. We entered the school, this was during our lunch break when it was forbidden to enter the school. As we entered the school, Mr Guard was waiting and was carrying a short bamboo cane he made us hold out our hands and caned us both for breaking a school rule. We were 8 years old.

I moved up into Mrs Farren's class, she was the head masters wife and was kind and I remember her taking our class for a day trip to London Zoo, a rare treat. I never saw her bad tempered or using any form of physical punishment although her husband did when necessary.

My final year at the school was in Mr Guard's class, he was a very tall well built man and very strict. He was full of tricks, he would often set the class some work to do and leave the room, after a while he would go into the inner quadrangle and try to approach our classroom windows unseen and when he would suddenly appear and would often catch some boy doing something wrong like leaving his desk and would be caned for his transgression. I was often in need of a haircut and he would grab my hair and say in a jocular way, "soon be sheep shearing time Reed", "Yes Sir" I would reply and make a mental note to get a hair cut as soon as I could.

He wore horn rimmed glasses and rode the biggest bicycle I had ever seen, it had 28 inch wheels and he looked a very imposing figure as he rode to and from school.

The headmaster was Mr Farren, he did not teach and I never had any contact with him.

During my early years at the school we had to bring in our own food for lunch. as food was rationed this was not easy and I can remember having just a jam sandwich for lunch. In my later years at the school a hot meal was supplied, cooked I believe at Eastbrook School and brought in by lorry.


We were allowed to leave the school premises after we had eaten our school lunch and we would often go to Pondfield Park to play. In a corner of the park was a paved area with swings and a roundabout. The roundabout was large and shaped like a witches hat, it was well balanced and would swing in a circular motion when pushed but boys would misuse it by making it move erratically and violently in directions that made it difficult to stay on it when used. There was a large piece of apparatus we called a zigzag which consisted of a heavy timbre structure with seats which was suspended at either end by solid steel arms with a boy at either end standing up and moving backwards and forwards to give it momentum it could move quite fast and sometimes it was used with two boys at either end when its movement was quite frightening. When it was time to return to school the park keeper (known as parkee) would blow a whistle and move us out of the park. My memory is that it was only boys who used the park.

In conclusion, I was quite happy at the school. There was some bullying, I did not bully anyone and I was not bullied. I was happy at Hunters Hall. I passed the eleven plus and went to Dagenham County High School, but that's another story. My best friend Michael Sands also passed the eleven plus but went to the South East Essex Technical College and after we left Hunters Hall I never saw him again.


Reading for Pleasure Matters at Hunters Hall


Reading interest: 4-8

We are four Education Mental Health Practitioner (EMHP), offering early intervention for young people with mild to moderate difficulties.

Our team work closely with young people, parents, and school staff to think together about ways to improve mental wellbeing within your school environment

Who do we work with?

Parents or Carers of pupils from reception to year 6 with mild-moderate levels of:

- Anxiety (e.g. fears, phobias, feeling panicky)
- Challenging behaviour (e.g. struggling to follow rules, temper tantrums, difficulty following requests)

Whole classes or year groups (delivering assembles and workshops)

- Provide early psychological support
- Support the school's wholeschool approach to wellbeing
