How can children take part in the Challenge?

The Summer Reading Challenge is a flexible programme that is designed for all levels

At the library

- 1. A child will visit their local library and sign up to the Challenge for free. They receive their Ready, Set, Read! core pack folder.
- 2. They set a personal reading goal for the
- 3. Borrow and read books, eBooks and audiobooks of their choice.
 - They can read anything they like: fiction, fact books, poetry, joke books, picture
- 4. Collect special incentives from the library each time they finish a book.
- 5. Receive a certificate and/or medal* for taking part, or for reaching their Challenge

In addition, libraries offer a wide variety of events and activities for families to enjoy throughout the summer.

Alternatively, children can participate in the Challenge online.


Children can also play games, enter competitions, share book recommendation and more on our free, safe, moderated platform.



Westminster Windrush 75 Festival

Honouring, acknowledging and celebrating the 75th anniversary of the extraordinary people who boarded on the Windrush for a better life. But this new chapter of their lives soon became a long road ahead of them with racism and segregation.


Yesterday Miss Monrose attended the Westminster Windrush 75 Festival alongside her grandmother Roseline. This festival highlights the history and culture of the black community in the UK through TV, Music, politics, fashion etc. Ms Roseline Monrose came to England 1962 from St. Lucia on the HMT Empire Windrush to find love with her now late husband, Mitchel. She began working her way into society as a catering assistant for the Metropolitan Police, then became charge of catering in 1969. She overcame the obstacles through her job. Settled into her new way of life. The hardest thing about it was not being able to find a place to live and experiencing the cold weather. Not something that I never experienced in the Caribbean. The love I had for my husband kept me going and pushing through. I cherish the memories we shared with one another.

Back in 2022, Roseline had the opportunity to be a part of a documentary focusing on the lives during and after Windrush. 'Still We Rise' has made it to multiple film festivals with more showings this month across London. There were many notable faces at the Westminster festival such as the Major of Westminster Councillor Patricia McAllister, British Soul Singer Heather Small and Ozzy and Carol, Veterans women of the Royal Army Corps, who led the army tribute at the base for the late Flight Sergeant Peter Brown in 2021. We value, respect and will continue to remember this time in history as with the Windrush, brought the well-known Notting Hill Carnival.




Reading for Pleasure Matters at Hunters Hall

Reading interest: 10-adult



Who are we?

We are four Education Mental Health Practitioner (EMHP), offering early intervention for young people with mild to moderate difficulties.

Our team work closely with young people, parents, and school staff to think together about ways to improve mental wellbeing within your school environment

Who do we work with?

Parents or Carers of pupils from reception to year 6 with mild-moderate levels of:

- Anxiety (e.g. fears, phobias, feeling panicky)
- Challenging behaviour (e.g. struggling to follow rules, temper tantrums, difficulty following requests)

Whole classes or year groups (delivering assembles and workshops)



Aims of our Team

- Provide early psychological support
- Support the school's wholeschool approach to wellbeing
- Signposting to specialist service


